"A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep."

This familiar passage about the good shepherd calls to mind soothing images from children's books that portray Jesus as a gentle shepherd carrying a lamb on his shoulders. But Jesus paints a much more powerful picture. His good shepherd is a protector; he watches over and guards his sheep. He doesn't sit by passively when predators approach; he acts swiftly to keep his flock safe. He doesn't flee or abandon them; he stands his ground and defends them (John 10:12). He even "lays down his life for the sheep" (10:11).

We know, of course, that Jesus is talking about himself. He is a shepherd unlike the "shepherds" of Israel. In the previous chapter of John's Gospel, the Jewish leaders responded to Jesus' miraculous healing by casting out the formerly blind man from the synagogue (9:34). Jesus offered healing and revelation to God's people, yet these



shepherds both rejected him themselves *and* prevented their "sheep" from receiving the abundant life that Jesus came to give them (10:10). In contrast, Jesus sought out the healed man, comforted him, and led him to faith (9:35-38). This is what a good shepherd does.

Jesus is not just "the" good shepherd; he is *your* good shepherd! Unlike a hired hand who works only for pay, Jesus is moved by a deep love for you. His love is so fierce that he freely, gladly offered his life on the cross for his sheep. For us. For *you*.

Today, rejoice that your good shepherd is guarding and protecting you. He is leading you securely along the perilous paths of life. He is defending you against the wolves and thieves that seek to "steal and slaughter and destroy" you (John 10:10). He is giving you new life that he won by laying down his life and taking it up again in his resurrection (10:18). He will never forsake you.







Of the Week

St. Bathild

Patroness of Children, Sick People, and Widows.

In the first half of the seventh century, Bathild was born to Anglo-Saxon parents. But early on, she was sold into slavery in slavery in France and served in the palace of King Clovis II. Because of her intelligence, she was given responsibilities far beyond her station, and eventually, she was noticed by the king. He grew so impressed with her grace, beauty and intelligence that in 649, he granted Bathild her freedom, and they were married. She became a model member of the nobility, and soon, she became known for her concern for the poor.

hen Clovis died in 657, Bathild was granted the regency on behalf of her five-year-old son, Clotaire III. With the help of her former master Erichinoald and a few French bishops, Bathild became a wise and caring regent.

An Enlightened Noble

In less that 10 years as regent, Bathild was able to achieve great reform. Never forgetting her roots, she ransomed Christian slaves and founded hospitals and other institutions to aid the poor. She also helped found several abbeys and monasteries, including those at Corbi and Chelles.

End of an Era

Bathild's regency ended in 665 after a tumultuous palace revolution. Finally free of the burden of power, she was able to realize her long-held wish to withdraw to a religious life.

She renounced all of her noble entitlements and entered hte Abbey of Chelles. Bathild lived there as the humblest of nuns, especially obedient and respectful of the abbess, and continued to serve the poor until her death in 680, after a lengthy and painful illness.





EUCHARISTIC CONGRESS TO FOCUS ON VOCATIONS


In just three months, tens of thousands of Catholics will gather in Indianapolis for the nation's first Eucharistic Congress in more than eight decades. While the main focus is clear—to adore Jesus truly present in the Blessed Sacrament—participants will also notice a heavy emphasis on vocations.

Religious communities from across the country will be attending, many underwritten by Serra International, which is organizing a large area in the convention hall that will be teeming with sisters and brothers. The Knights of Columbus are sponsoring an entire section to showcase diocesan priesthood, with a small army of priests on hand to talk with young men.

Also in attendance will be hundreds of seminarians, many of whom will have just completed the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, an ambitious project that will see thousands marching toward Indiana along different routes totalling 6,500 miles.

The connection between the Eucharist and vocations is clear: Three-quarters of recently ordained priests regularly participated in Eucharistic Adoration before entering seminary. And at Catholic youth events, even those offering sports and high-energy activities, teen participants still rank one "activity" as their favorite: Adoration.

As the Church prepares for this historic event, let's ask our Eucharistic Lord for an outpouring of vocations!



IDEAS FOR ACTION

HOLY FATHER: DO THESE FOUR THINGS

In a papal message for World Day of Prayer for Vocations, Pope Francis used the term "con-vocation" to explain that a vocation is not an isolated "me-and-God" experience. Instead, young people hear God's call within a real Church community. He offered four concrete ways to help youth discover their vocations, emphasizing these things should be done together:

- 1. Co-teach with a catechist
- Visit a convent or monastery
- 3. Assist missionaries
- 4. Spend time with parish priests

Note that none of these involve phones or social media. How can you organize real-life activities for youth in your parish?



SERRA CELEBRATES 100 MONTHS

THE GLOBAL ROSARY FOR VOCATIONS

For 100 months, Catholics from around the world have joined a massive video/phone call during which they pray the rosary to intercede for vocations. Created by Tim O'Neill in 2015, the Global Rosary brings together Serra Clubs comprised of lay people dedicated to promoting priesthood and consecrated life. "In its simplicity it becomes quite a feat," said Tim. "It gives a chance for people worldwide to visit beforehand and after.... The most powerful way we Serrans connect is through prayer."




