"We will do everything that the Lord has told us."

n Mount Sinai, Moses presided over the swearing of a sacred covenant between God and the people of Israel. After explaining the provisions of this covenant, Moses sprinkled the people with the blood of sacrificed animals, and the people responded by promising to "heed and do" everything God had commanded (Exodus 24:7). They have their marching orders, and they intend to follow them.

The Israelites' response to Moses is clearly admirable and pleasing to the Lord, but today's feast of the Body and Blood of Christ invites us to consider another aspect of our response to him. We are so used to focusing on "doing," but at Its heart, the mystery of the Eucharist is focused on "being" more than "doing." Just as the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of the Lord at Mass, so do we become the body of Christ when we gather for worship and receive him in Communion. So when we say "Amen" just



before receiving the Eucharist, we can say in our hearts, "We will *be* everything the Lord has made us to be."

This is one of the greatest miracles of our faith. As the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council taught, "Really partaking of the body of the Lord in the breaking of the Eucharistic bread, we are taken up into communion with him and with one another" (*Lumen Gentium*, 7). Communion—with Christ! And that communion, received in faith and founded on grace, changes us. It fills us with divine love and divine grace. It transforms us so that we become more like Jesus.

Of course, it's a good thing to *do* what God is asking us to do. But today is a perfect day to celebrate who you *are becoming*. Treasured and redeemed and beloved, you are taking on the likeness of the very One you are receiving!

Catholics Participating in National Eucharistic Pilgrimage and the National Eucharistic Congress Have Opportunities to Receive Plenary Indulgences.

"It is with gratitude to the Holy Father that we receive his Apostolic Blessing upon the participants in the National Eucharistic Congress, and for the opportunity for Catholics in our country to obtain a plenary indulgence by participating in the events of the Eucharistic Revival," said Archbishop Timothy P. Brogilio, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops. Fostering encounter, sparking personal conversion, and forming disciples will be opportunities for a personal revival in the faith and the fruits of the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage and National Eucharistic Congress to be held this summer.

Plenary Indulgence for National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

A decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis indicates that the plenary indulgence will be granted to the Christian faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage at any point between May 17 and July 16, 2024. It will also be granted to the elderly, infirm, and all those who cannot leave their homes for a serious reason and who participate in spirit with the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage, uniting their prayers, pains, or inconveniences with Christ and the pilgrimage. This indulgence is granted under the usual conditions of sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The faithful may also apply this indulgence through suffrage for the souls of the faithful departed in Purgatory. In recognition of this extraordinary event, the Apostolic Penitentiary also requests that all priests who have been endowed with the appropriate faculties for hearing Confessions present themselves willingly and generously in administering the Sacrament of Penance to all who participate in the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage.

Papal Blessing with Plenary Indulgence for National Eucharistic Congress

The second decree issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary and approved by Pope Francis, says that Archbishop Broglio or another prelate of episcopal rank assigned by him, following the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, may impart the Papal Blessing with a Plenary Indulgence to the Christian Faithful who participate in the National Eucharistic Congress, who are truly repentant, and who are motivated by charity, if the usual conditions for indulgences—sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father—have been met. Faithful individuals who, due to reasonable circumstances and with pious intention, have participated in the sacred rites and received the Papal Blessing through media communications, may also obtain a Plenary Indulgence.



Of the Week

St. Kevin

Abbot and Patron of Glendalough & Patron of Dublin, Ireland

Feast Day: June 3

A ccording to tradition, Kevin was born in Leinster, the son of Irish nobility. He was given the Celtic name Coemgen, or "Fair-begotten." Kevin studied at a monastic school, was ordained and then decided to start a life of solitary prayer. He settled in Glendalough and lived in a cave now known as St. Kevin's Bed. Surviving on nettles and herbs, he remained alone for seven years.


A local farmer convinced Kevin to end his solitary life, and the devout monk soon developed a loyal group of disciples. Kevin and his followers built a church on a mountain ledge, and they lived nearby in huts. The community at Glendalough grew rapidly, and Kevin became its abbot. It is said that Kevin also founded several monasteries nearby and that a town developed around them.

Seeking Solace

B ut Kevin missed the solitary life, and once Glendalough was well established, he withdrew again to live as a hermit for four more years.

God's creatures

All other accounts of Kevin are based on legend, and many involve his close relationship with animals. One describes how an otter brough salmon every day to feed Kevin and his followers as they built their first settlement. Another tells of a cow that often licked Kevin's clothes as the monk prayed and subsequently was able to produce the milk of 50 cows. A third legend says Kevin once had his arms outstretched in prayer when a blackbird laid an egg in his hand. The monk supposedly remained in that position until the egg hatched. Today, kind-hearted Kevin is often depicted with a blackbird in his hand.



Evin died when he was 120 years old. After his death, Glendalough expanded even more, and it became one of the four main pilgrimage sites in Ireland.

The Body and Blood of Christ


Jesus Christ, God with Us

The incarnation is more than a doctrine of faith just found in theology textbooks. It reveals the most fundamental way that God chooses to relate to creation and to us as human beings. The idea of a divine being taking human form is not unique to Christianity for many pagan religions had similar tales of their gods appearing in human form. But Jesus' incarnation is unique in what it says about the God who comes into the world in the person of Jesus of Nazareth.

First, we must be precise: to speak of the incarnation is to speak of the human embodiment of the second person of the Trinity, the Word of God. In itself the incarnation is an act of the whole Trinity—the Father wills that the Word become human through the power of the Holy Spirit.

The spatial notion of Christ being in heaven before the incarnation and being on earth after it cannot be applied here. God is not bound by the same strictures that bind us as embodied creatures who are always in one time and place. As St. Hilary of Poitiers noted, "Christ does not cease to be divine because he became human, nor fail to be human because he remained forever divine." The Word made flesh involves God in time and history in a new way and declares God's Lordship over both.

Second, the incarnation expresses God's love and desire for a new creation, one not distorted and disfigured by evil and sin. The Word becomes flesh in order that the children of flesh might become children of God, not just in their origin but in their very nature. The early teachers of the Church spoke of this as *theopoesis* (Greek: "making God-like"). By this they do not mean that Christians become gods, but rather that through our baptism into Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit we are enabled to share in the divine life (sanctifying grace) and thus be completely transformed into Christ's image. Through this divine life working within us we share with God in the re-creation of the world.



Jesus Gives Himself So We Might Live

Without food, we cannot survive and we die. So feeding was the responsibility of the father or head of the household. When the Hebrews were liberated from Egypt in the exodus to become God's covenant community, they expected that God the new "father" of their community would feed them. God fulfilled this expectation and first gave them manna and quail for their food in the wilderness (Ex 16), then gave them a land where they could grow crops to support themselves.

This gift of food was only a preview of what God would do with Jesus. Jesus, who shows his divinity by doing the things that only God can do (forgiving sins, controlling storms) also shares God's ability to give food. Jesus makes bread available to the hungry crowds—a sign of how eager and willing God is to provide what we need for survival.

But Jesus, at the Last Supper, went one step further. He not only gave bread; he also promised that he would actually become the bread and wine in the celebration of the eucharistic ritual. With this holy food and drink, his own body and blood, he nourishes us so that we can begin to share now in communion with God's own life. His gift of himself as our food and drink is the gift making possible our ongoing communion and life with God.

The sign of our "thanksgiving" or eucharist is to imitate Jesus' action of taking, blessing, breaking and sharing bread and wine, which represent the essential nourishment for our lives. He transforms the bread and wine into his body and blood so we can share his life and sustenance. Just as plants and animals give up their lives to become our food, so Jesus gives his life to become our nourishment. He expects us to do the same.

The Eucharist: Growing in Communion with Christ

The Eucharist is the way that we nourish our relationship with God and deepen our communion with God and one another. At Mass, we do some of the same things that we do at home—gather with others, listen to God's word, praise and thank God, bless bread and share meals, and carry on Christ's mission. Both at home and at church, Christ is present, inviting us into deeper communion with him and with others. Our communion grows through the ritual of receiving and giving, gathering to immerse ourselves in God's word, sharing a sacred meal, and eagerly accepting the commission to carry on Christ's work for the world.

Growing in relationship with Christ is an everyday task, so the more we understand about the Eucharist, the more we will be able to move from celebrating on Sunday to living eucharistic lives during the rest of the week. Communion with Christ and with the Christian community in each Eucharist offers the nourishment we need for a life-long process of becoming a Christian. Our goal is not just participation in our eucharistic celebration (communion), but on making our whole life a eucharistic experience.

We participate in our Eucharist so that we may be transformed by God and sent back into the world. Our Eucharist is a celebration of the Eucharist of our daily lives. Everything is changed when God gifts us with life and we say "thanks" with our lives.

Our challenge, then, is to connect our experience of Christ's presence found in the eucharistic celebration with those found in our households and in our everyday lives. Thus our whole lives become an experience of growing in communion with Christ and with others. Celebrating the Eucharist brings about changes in ourselves and then invites us to change our behavior in our household, in our school, at our job and in every other part of our life.

PREPARE YOUR HOME TO WEATHER THE STORM.

MDOT recommends you make plans, take action and gather the materials needed to secure your property.

EMERGENCY HOME READINESS CHECKLIST

- Be prepared to cover all of your home's windows by installing permanent storm shutters or plan to board up windows with 5/8" exterior grade or marine plywood, cut to fit and ready to instal!.
 - Note: Tape does not prevent windows from breaking.
- Reduce roof damage by installing straps or additional clips to fasten your roof to the frame structure.
- Trim trees and shrubs so they are more wind resistant.
- Clear loose and dogged rain gutters and downspouts.
- Reinforce your garage doors with a counterbalancing kit.
- If you have a boat, determine how and where to secure it.

IF A HURRICANE IS COMING

- Shut off utilities and propage tanks.
- □ Turn your refrigerator and freezer to the coldest setting and leave the doors closed.
- Fill a tub with water.

- Unplug appliances and electronics.
- Listen closely to advice from local and state emergency officials.
- Bring in all outdoor furniture, garbage cans and anything else that is not tied down.
- □ Notify neighbors and a family member outside of the impacted area of your evacuation plans.
- Stay with friends, relatives or at an inland hotel or, as a last resort, go to a designated public shelter outside of the flood zone.
- Leave mobile homes in any case.
